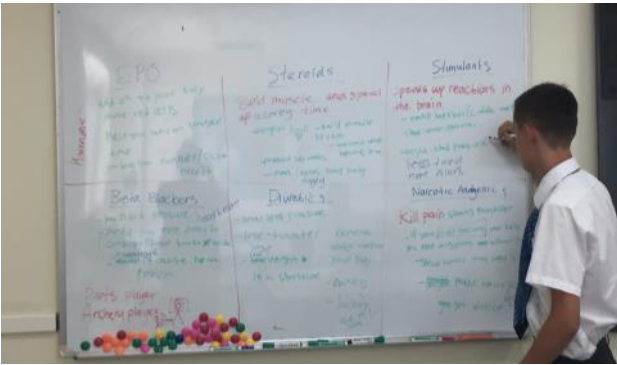

Year 10 GCSE PE

Over the last four lessons, Year 10 GCSE PE students have been learning about performance-enhancing drugs in sport. They have been developing their knowledge of different types of performance-enhancing drugs, blood doping and analysing the advantages and disadvantages of sporting performers taking them. Students have also been looking at case studies of famous athletes who have been caught and banned from their respective sports. One case which pupils found particularly interesting was the story of Lance Armstrong and how he was stripped of 7 Tour De France titles for blood doping. Students are now able to answer extended writing questions in detail and this analysis has been excellent practice for the GCSE PE exam.



Year 6 Transition Day

This week, the Year 6 pupils took part in the second transition day of the year to help prepare them for life in our secondary school. The Year 6 class followed a sample timetable of a Year 7 pupil and took part in Geography, Chemistry, Maths, English, ICT, PE and PSHE lessons throughout the day. They had a really busy day and met many of the teachers that will be teaching them next year. It was great to watch the interactions between secondary and Year 6 pupils at break time and during the PE lesson. I hope that this special day made them excited to join us properly in August!





Primary Languages

Hebrew



This month, the state of Israel celebrated its 69th Independence Day, and to bear cultural witness to this occasion, the students in the Britannica Hebrew classes were introduced to Israel's national anthem. For children who are growing up outside of Israel, it's very difficult to grasp the profound meaning of the national anthem, therefore, we spoke about the story "behind" the words, in order to make the lyrics sound more realistic and perceptible. Our students really appreciated learning this and it reminded them that Hebrew, like all languages, is rooted in cultural identity.

Italian

Our Primary Italian classes have been very intense recently, and the children are about to reach their final goals. Year 1 and Year 2 pupils have made great progress in the analysis of Italian sounds and syllables, and they have become very proactive little readers. Year 3 pupils have also made good progress in overcoming Italian orthographic difficulties and in reading increasingly complex texts. They also enjoyed writing the personal description of themselves. Finally, Year 5 students have shown a good understanding of the morphological analysis of nouns and articles, and they are currently learning how to write both an informal and formal letter. The first stop was the animal exhibit, which featured extinct species and species that can still be seen today. It was interesting to see which animals we could identify without signs to assist the identification process.

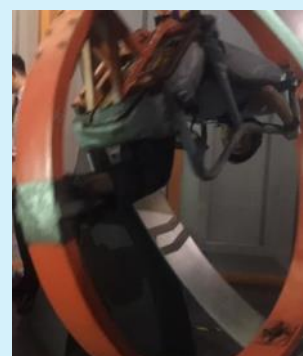

Some have even broken free of their cocoons and become moths. We have observed and written about their life cycle, which will begin again as soon as our moths have laid lots of eggs!

We have also continued our dinosaur theme and created some excellent pieces of art by using pasta to make a picture of our favourite dinosaur. In English, we have been working very hard at using comparative adjectives to describe different dinosaurs using the suffixes *-er* and *-est*. In Maths, we have been counting and sharing in 2s, 5s and 10. Everyone has been working very hard to understand these difficult concepts and enjoyed using different methods to work out number problems.

What a great week Year 2 has had. It was with much excitement that we headed off to the National History Museum. At times the children didn't know where to start looking as there was so much to see! The children saw a lot of skeletons and were able to compare the skeletons of different creatures. They also tried hard to name all the different joints of the skeletons they saw. The children also really enjoyed comparing their handprints to different primates and looking at how humans have evolved. Upon returning to school, the children recalled the information they had learnt and were adamant they would like to visit again.

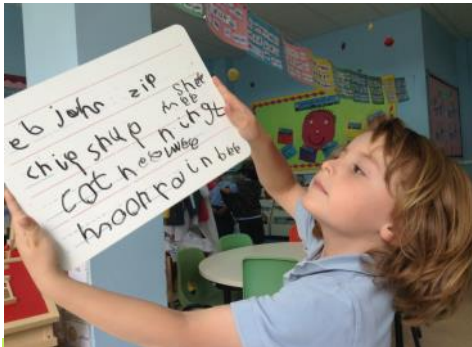
