#### <u>Week in Pre-Nursery</u>

Pre-Nursery children are now very comfortable, confident and secure in their learning environment and with our team of educators. It is now that we are fortunate to witness spontaneous learning occurring through children's exploration, natural curiosity, and imagination.

This week one of our children opened a page in a book and happily began singing. To my surprise, he had demonstrated an understanding and connection between sheet music and song. This exciting discovery prompted a focus on instrumental music classes this week where we experimented with sound, regulating rhythm, identifying patterns and practicing our math as we counted out beats.

Pictured below in the arms of one of our little learners is our new class pet, Biscuit. Biscuit has a home, food bowl, and leash in the classroom. As a class we are learning to care for Biscuit, ensuring he is fed, warm at nap time, is walked and nurtured. Biscuit also acts as a token reward in class for good behaviour, good manners, sitting and listening at carpet time and use of our focus English words. As we continue with our thematic topic, "My School", Biscuit is helping us to educate our children about the use of gentle hands, friendly behaviour and use of language to defend personal space.

Our children threw themselves into art projects this week. They were inspired by the sites and scenes of Pumpkin Palooza and we extended on this excitement by creating spiders and a class snake now on display. In support of Anti-Bullying Week, children got busy and messy with blue, contributing to our school blue banner of support.





#### Week in Nursery

For our final week of the half term, we have been exploring the autumnal changes that we see in our world. We have been continuing to mix autumn colours to create the autumn scenes that you can see on display in our classrooms. We have spoken about the changes that are taking place in the weather and have talked about how we now need to dress appropriately for winter.

This week, we have also had a focus on using kind hands and words in Nursery, to support an Anti-Bullying Week. ## <u>Year 2</u>

The children in Year 2 have had a successful week investigating how seeds grow. They were able to record their predictions and findings with the help of Discovery Dog! Within this experiment, we investigated several different questions about what a seed needs to grow. Discovery Dog showed Year 2 pupils how to plan an experiment and what kind of questions that they need to answer.

In another short investigation, pupils were given two items, food colouring, and celery. They then had to figure out an experiment that we could do. After many ideas and suggestions, we eventually settled on putting the celery in coloured water and waited to see what happened. Pupils were then able to visually see that water travels through the stem and into the leaves. Who knew you could have red, green and even blue celery! There are some budding scientists in the making, if the celery is good enough!



## <u>Key Stage 1 – Art!</u>

In Year 1, students have recently been learning about different geometric shapes, as well as naming lots of them, we have been cutting templates of shapes and making figures. With paper, they have collaged different coloured shapes together to form patterns which resemble body shapes and form.

In Year 2, students have looked at letter shapes in the spelling of their names. Each shape and overlapping letter creates a new irregular shape. Students have learned about controlling their shading and filled out these shapes using flat, bold colours. Keeping with the theme of overlapping shapes and patterns, students have used a range of geometric shapes to create abstract patterns and use of tones and colour.





#### <u>Year 3</u>

In Year 3 this week we have been busy finishing off our Roald Dahl topic by writing our own stories inspired by "James and the Giant Peach". We have planned, written and edited our stories and we cannot wait for you to read them too. In Maths, we have been continuing to learn about shape by looking at different types of angles and lines. In Topic we have finished painting our peaches, and are now adding the finishing touches like leaves and a stem. We have loved getting involved with all the fantastic Anti-Bullying activities over the week. We made some cool blue bunting and eye-catching Anti-Bullying posters. What an excellent way to finish this half-term! We look forward to seeing all our parents after the holiday on Friday, 24th November for our Thanksgiving Celebration morning.





#### <u>Year 4</u>

This week has been incredibly busy in Year 4. We have continued our hard work in Maths, focusing on measures and mental maths skills. We have all been working hard on learning our time's tables and division facts whilst helping each other during our morning quick-fire recall tests. We are impressed by the amount of knowledge children are retaining from their new found Maths skills and everyone should feel very proud of themselves. During this week, we have completed many tasks related directly to Anti-Bullying Week. Exciting posters and poems are just some of the highlights that will be used for display along with our exciting and inviting corridor.







#### <u>Year 5</u>

Year 5 have had another incredibly busy week. In Maths, we have put to use our knowledge to solve problems, and also begun to use a Maths website called <u>www.imymaths.com</u> where we can test how well we understand what we have learnt. As part of Anti-Bullying Week, we have also been thinking carefully about the effects that bullying can have on others and how it is important to stand up for other people. We watched a short video clip of a boy with one wing, and have chosen what form of writing to retell it; either in the form of a diary entry, letter or story.



#### <u>Year 6</u>

Year 6 have thrown themselves enthusiastically into Anti-Bullying Week and have produced some powerful posters to show their stance on this important issue. The classes focussed on fostering a positive and supportive atmosphere by completing activities that boosted self-esteem. It was a surprise for many of the children to discover just how highly others think of them. In their English Instructions unit, we are learning about imperative verbs in order to write a sequence of instructional steps. We analysed different types of instructional texts and annotated their features. Then we made spooky Jack 'o' Lanterns and produced individual instructions so that other children could recreate them. In addition, we linked this to the work of Leonardo da Vinci and his keen interest in geometry, and made "Himmeli Sculptures". For the finale, we will be writing the instructions to sculpt our very own clay horses.





#### Year 9 English

For the past few weeks, Year 9 students have been examining the genre of Gothic Literature. We started our Gothic Literature study with *The "Tell-Tale Heart"* by Edgar Allen Poe. The students were able to use their knowledge of Gothic conventions to write a second part to Poe's haunting story. Next, the students learned about the sub-genre of science in Gothic literature when they explored "*Frankenstein*" and completed an author-study on Mary Shelley. Currently, Year 9 students have been considering setting as a Gothic convention in *The Hound of Baskervilles*" by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. Year 9 will be finishing our Gothic Literature study by comparing and contrasting the conventions found in the three texts
