Dear Parents,

Week in Pre-Nursery

We made a number of treks to the school theatre this week in Pre-Nursery as we prepare for our upcoming Winter concert. Moving children to new areas of the school and holding class in a new environment is a new experience for children and some can find these transitions challenging. With patience, care and well thought out plans, these regular exercises help children to develop their confidence and sense of independence.

As part of our learning topic, "My Family", we explored areas of the home and introduced new vocabulary to children. We investigated heart shapes through art and talked about feelings of love associated with family members and friends.

Children had much fun modelling the interior of a home with Miss Rachael and talked about the activities that take place as a family in areas of the home such as cooking in the kitchen, watching television in the lounge and showering in the bathroom.

We continued reading about the journeys of our friend Biscuit, children relating to Biscuit's bedtime routine at home and sharing cuddles and kisses with mum and dad before being tucked in. Children found joy in our new "hide and seek" sensory play area, seeking out friends and hiding from others.

Week in Reception

Reception have been flying all over Europe this week visiting different European countries. They have been looking at the wonderful cities that are in Europe, such as London, Paris and Rome. In England, we looked at famous buildings and, in Spain, we tried flamenco dancing. Reception have even used their mathematical topic on 3D shapes to try to build the Eiffel Tower and Big Ben.





Week in Reception





Year 1

Year 1 have continued to be enthralled by their topic of Great Explorers and have been learning about Captain Robert Scott and Amundsen and their "Race to the Pole". The children learnt about the different types of equipment that was used on this epic journey and compared the materials that their clothes were made of to modern clothing. This then led Year 1 to begin their very exciting investigation into what would make the best material for an Arctic glove. Watch this space to find out!

The children also began story mapping to develop their grammar and comprehension skills through the true story of "Tom Crean's Rabbit". We worked together to sequence the key events of this wonderful and touching story about a mother rabbit aboard Scott's ship.

In Mathematics, the children looked at ordinal numbers and consolidated their learning by playing the iceberg game by putting themselves in order. Have a look and see if you can work out who came 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th..... all the way to 18th!

Year 2

This week, Year 2 have welcomed some new, but familiar faces into their classrooms. It is easy to say that everyone is getting on well and are still working as equally as hard!

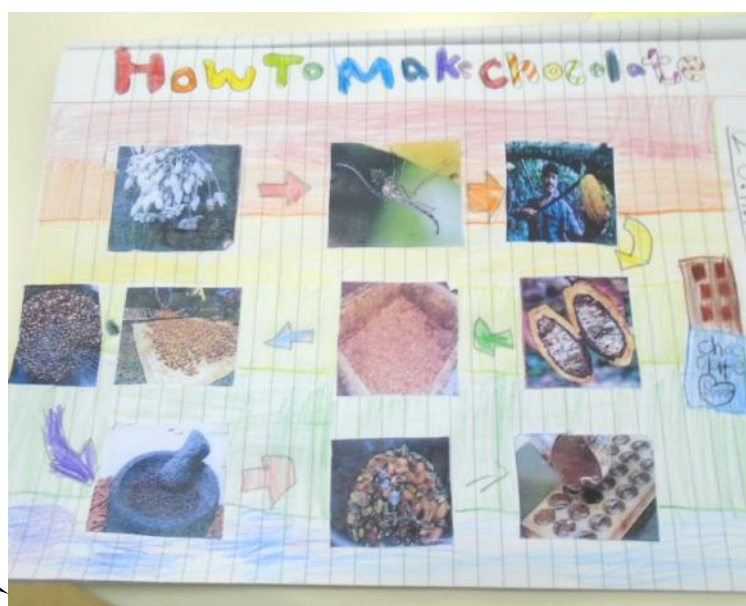
In English, most of us have been adding the finishing touches to our changed fairy tale. We have been writing about the new problem in our story and have been looking at different ways to end the story as well. It turns out that Little Blue Riding Hood, Silverlocks and the under-sea turtle and hare type races of the fish, mermaids and sharks have some BIG problems to try and fix.

In Maths, we have been re-introduced to some simple multiplication. Over the next two weeks, we will be investigating different methods to multiply and try to figure out which way that we find easiest. This week, we have been sorting a number into equal groups and working out the sum and arrays. Have a look at our pictures to see how we did.



As we gear up for a chocolate factory trip next week, in our Topic lessons we have done even more investigating into where chocolate comes from and how it is made. We had a look at the different countries that make chocolate, like Brazil and Ghana, and we had a look at how the cocoa bean is harvested. Who knew it was such hard work to get some chocolate?!

After some research, as well as sequencing pictures; it turns out, this is the process to make some delicious chocolate!





Year 3

For our "Festivals and Celebrations" topic, Year 3 have started to explore Diwali – "The Festival of Light". Children started by reading an information text about Diwali and discussed all the different preparations that take place in family homes across the world. One aspect we explored was the designs and creations of Rangoli patterns. Children created their own Rangoli designs first with coloured pencil, then with oil pastels against black card. *"I loved doing the Rangoli art because they look beautiful and the colours are so bright"* Kyla 3A. *"I have learnt that people put lights outside their houses because they want to welcome their families and friends"* Vivian 3A.



Year 4

This week, we have been incredibly busy once again. In English we have been looking at non-fiction text, researching all about Henry VIII and his 6 wives. Children have learnt lots of new facts and truly immersed themselves within the topic of "Hang onto your Head", finding out all about life in Tudor Britain!

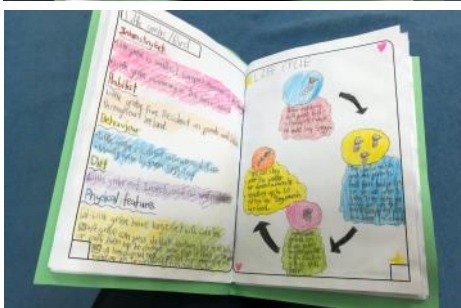
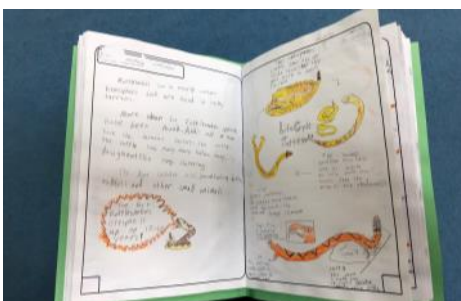
Within our topic lessons, we have completed beautiful pastel portraits of Henry VIII which look wonderful and really showcase the children's artistic talents. Furthermore, we were able to create detailed family trees which focused to show who Henry VIII married, in what order and what children he had. All of the Year 4 children have enjoyed learning new bits of information and fully believe in the idea that "Knowledge is power", happily extending their own general knowledge about British world history.





Year 5

In Science, Year 5 have nearly completed their unit on "Living Things". Each group was responsible for one habitat: rivers, polar regions, mountains, or grasslands. Students then used books, atlases, and online resources to research information about specific animals that live in their group's habitat. Their written report included information on the animal's life cycle, behaviour, diet and physical features. All of the class' work was then combined to form Year 5's very own mega book to teach others about such diverse species of animal, such as the harp seal, river otter, flying squirrel and the amazingly interesting (but little known) Greenland shark!



Year 6

Year 6 have had a very productive week. In English, 6A finished researching survival skills and in groups published our instructions on what to do in the case of an emergency. In Maths, we were able to complete a survey to gather information and could represent this on a variety of types of chart including line graphs, bar graphs and pie charts. We also practised our ICT skills using the amazing app "Createagraph" to input data and present our findings. In 6B we finished our topic of Leonardo da Vinci and his love of geometric shapes by making our own sun dials. The children had to recall their knowledge of angles, and measured and skilfully used a protractor to accurately draw their lines for their sun dials. We then tested these out and explored the advantage and disadvantages when compared to modern day technology.





Year7 Geography

Students have become the teachers this week as we have used peer learning to teach each other the rules of six-figure grid references. We have even applied this knowledge so we can locate and recognise features of rivers on OS maps.



Year 8 Geography

Year 8 students have been super creative this week; making their own model rainforests. Students have had to show their knowledge of the different rainforest layers as well as the plants and animals that are adapted to live there. Some very creative thinking has been taking place. The finished rainforests will be on display next week!



Year 10 and 11 PSHE

Recently in PSHE Year 10 and 11 students have been working on a broadcast media production. They have split into three news teams and will be filming over the course of the next few weeks. They will be covering various events around Britannica including football matches, sports events, music rehearsals, and other exciting activities going on around the school. They will be interviewing students and teachers about some serious issues and some not so serious issues. The aim of the project is for students to work as a team, be creative and improve their use of technology and media, which also includes video editing. Their final pieces will be shown in assembly. This is an exciting time and we are eagerly awaiting the final pieces.
