Our Pre-Nursery children were all excited to prepare special gifts for their mums for Mother's Day, squeezing paint and decorating cards. Next week we begin our topic, *At the Beach*. Fe Fi Fo Fum! The Nursery children have been using language from the story of *Jack and the Beanstalk* to retell the story and to act it out during their play. We have used talk partners to discuss whether Jack should have taken the giant's golden harp and the hen that lays the golden egg; we came to the conclusion straight away that Jack was wrong to take the giants possessions! We have used the story of *Jack and the Beanstalk* as a springboard to teach the children about planting and what plants need in order to grow- sunshine, water and soil. Over the next week or so we will be planting our own seeds and monitoring them to see how tall they grow, encouraging children to use size language, such as tall, taller, tallest, big, biggest, and small, smallest.

Week in Reception













<u>Year 1</u>

In Year 1 this week, the students worked on creating a special poem for their mums. Mother's Day is a celebration honouring the mother of the family, as well as motherhood, maternal bonds, and the influence of mothers in society. The students, who have never written a poem on their own before, looked at and discussed different poems. This assisted in them feeling supported and guided during the activity. We also looked at different rhyming patterns and began to realise that not all poems need to rhyme. However, we also made it a fun activity by trying to spot rhyming words in the poems we read, written and presented to the class. We are really looking forward to sharing these with you very soon!



<u>Year 2</u>

How many bones does an adult have? What are the names of the bones in the leg? Or arm? Or even your chest? How many can you name? These have been some of the questions posed (and answered) by our Year 2 students over the last couple of weeks – certainly no lazy bones here. We have tried making our very own skeleton but have not started to move on to other parts of the body. In Maths we've been thinking about data, in particular, how to collect it and how to show it. We have come up with tally charts, pictographs and bar charts. We have managed to produce some great looking graphs and collect some interesting data! In English this week, we have started to look at extended (or chapter) stories. We have been looking at Mountain Mona, the goat that appears to be not very good at things. We've started to break each of the chapters down to look at the detail that we need to include. Our Year 2's have done an excellent job of pulling apart the story!







<u>Year 3</u>

The past week has been another busy and productive week in Year 3.

We had an exciting lesson learning about how easily germs can spread and used our fun experiment to help our teachers and other children in our school to understand the importance of washing your hands!

In Maths the children have been learning about money. 3C worked very hard as shopkeepers; converting money from pence to pounds, and adding different values. In English, the children completed their biographies on Tutankhamun, editing their work and checking them against their Writing Targets.





<u>Year 4</u>

What a great week it has been in Year 4 here at Britannica. In Topic, children have been working collaboratively to research and locate information under a given heading, such as food, Beijing and Xi Jin Ping, in order to create further pages for our books about China. Working together, listening to one another's ideas and reflections has been lovely to see. In our English lessons we have been focusing on skills within comprehension and asking questions. A big area that we have also been working on is presentation and handwriting. Children work hard to be given a handwriting pen that they can use in class, therefore empowering themselves through determination and perseverance. Within our Internationalism lessons we have continued to explore and delve into the theme of 'Peace' with children drafting and editing their own version of Jill Murphy's story *Peace at Last*. During this time children have been able to fully reflect on how lucky we are to have such peaceful and safe lives, thinking thoughtfully about people all over the world who may live in a state of unrest. Well done Year 4 for being so honest and open to learning about this complex theme. Finally at the end of this very busy week, we welcomed mums onto our lovely corridor where we were creatively making photo frames and special Mother's Day bead bracelets. Thank you mums for coming in and celebrating with us. Again, we thank all parents for their continued support and kindness.









<u>Year 5</u>

On Wednesday, Year 5 were presented with a diagram of a complicated machine. We had to decide what it was used for and explain how it worked. Then, we walked around the room to look at each other's ideas and decide which idea and explanation was the best; there were some very imaginative and entertaining explanations. Eventually we found out its real name - 'The Teacher Pleaser'! We read how it works and began to identify the different features of an explanation text. We are looking forward to reading and writing our own explanation texts over the next few weeks.





<u>Year 6</u>

As the continuation of our science topic of Body Systems, children recently finished their section on digestion and are now exploring healthy eating. They learnt about the various food groups and how it is vital to balance these to maintain well-functioning bodily systems. The entry point to this involved children identifying key food stuffs from each group. They then organised these on a pie chart in order to build necessary vocabulary and demonstrate amounts required to maintain a balanced diet in daily life. This tied in very well with recent work on proportion and ratio in Mathematics. We will continue by creating various surveys to gather data about our lifestyles and use this to present and interpret information on a range of types of graph. In English, Year 6 continue to work on writing suspenseful paragraphs and are selecting appropriate vocabulary and using speech to enhance the atmosphere of their pieces.





<u>Year 7 PSHE</u>

For the last few weeks in PHSE Year 7 have been exploring the ideas of equality and fairness. We have really focused on the Fairtrade movement. Fairtrade is a simple way to make a difference to the lives of the people who grow the things we love. We do this by changing the way trade works through better prices, decent working conditions and a fair deal for farmers and workers in developing countries.

Year 7 have learnt about the impact of Fairtrade in local communities and have taken part in a variety of activities such as, writing a letter to Mr Goodwin asking him to consider using only Fairtrade products in the canteen and designing a new chocolate bar that has an emphasis on sustainable farming and Fairtrade practices. As always Year 7 have explored this new idea with maturity and insight. Well done year 7 and let's see if we can really make a difference.



Saturday School

Saturday school this term has been a huge success, and we have happily been welcoming more students from the wider Shanghai community than ever before. Our students have been working incredibly hard in improving their English language skills and I am pleased to see so much progress taking place.

This week saw for the first time our Key stage 1 and 2 students working together during their English class. It was wonderful to see our older students helping our younger students. Their task was to design their dream car and pitch it to the group; I was very impressed with the level of imagination and creativity on show early on a Saturday morning.


