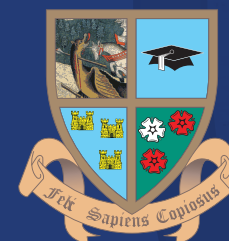

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Introduction

Welcome to the IGCSE options process for Year 9 students at Britannica. Choosing your IGCSE subjects is an important stage in your education. We know that it can be a difficult time and can cause anxiety because there are many questions that you might have. This booklet and the options process are designed to make this time less worrying for you and your parents. The process will help you to start making decisions about your learning and to choose subjects that suit your aspirations, skills and needs. Please use all the information available to you: this booklet; advice from subject teachers; your class teachers and your parents. These people know you and may offer advice as to whether they think a subject would suit you as a learner.

Choosing IGCSE Options

Students are advised to choose subjects which they are good at, they enjoy, and which will open doors for them in the future. Students are advised about course content from the teaching staff at Britannica and meetings are held to discuss the options process in order to provide informed choices for our students. IGCSE options should be confirmed before the end of April, whilst every effort is made to accommodate students' first choices, this may not always be possible as class sizes need to be viable in order for classes to be timetabled.

You should remember the following when selecting options:

Do

- Do choose subjects which you like or enjoy.
- Do choose subjects at which you are successful.
- Do choose subjects which you may need for a career or further education.
- Do find out everything that you can about the subject before you choose it. Once you have started a subject we expect you to stick with it for the full two years.
- Do talk to the people who know you best.
- Do listen to the advice your subject teachers give you.

Do not

- Do not choose a subject just because your friend has chosen it; friendships may change with time but your IGCSE grades will remain with you forever.
- Do not choose a subject just because you like, or dislike a particular teacher. They may not end up teaching you!

Changing an Option Subject:
A change of subject is always possible. A change can still be made in Year 10 when the course has started, however, the later a subject change is made the more difficult it can be to catch up on any missed work. Any subject changes must be requested in writing and confirmed by the Head of Secondary.

Each course will give information about the type of qualification awarded, the assessment process and progression routes for this subject. Art and Design/ Fine Art

Course Code: 4FA1

Exam Board: Edexcel

Aims

Students are expected to select appropriate visual forms and conduct research, gathering, selecting, and organising visual and other relevant information.

They develop their creative, imaginative, and intuitive capabilities while exploring and creating images, artifacts, and products. The course encourages students to take risks and learn from experiences, they gain confidence in experimenting with ideas, processes, media, materials, and techniques.

They will explore pertinent resources, analyse, discuss, and evaluate images, objects, and artifacts, making independent judgments. By using their knowledge and understanding of the work of others, students will develop and extend their own thinking to inform their artistic practice.

They will generate and explore potential lines of inquiry through appropriate media and techniques, showcasing their work. Additionally, students will apply their knowledge in creating images and artifacts, reviewing and modifying their work based on their own evaluations and those of others. They will organise, select, and communicate ideas, solutions, and responses, presenting them in a variety of visual, tactile, and sensory forms.

Students actively engage in the creative process of

art, craft, and design to become effective and independent learners, fostering critical and reflective thinking with enquiring minds.

Content Overview

The IGCSE in Art and Design is a broad and flexible course that encourages students to appreciate the creative process through practical responses using a variety of two-dimensional and three-dimensional media, materials, techniques, and processes.

Students critically explore how artists, craftspeople, and designers from diverse cultures, times, and societies have arrived at solutions and communicated meaning through the formal elements of art. This knowledge informs them of new ideas, observations, and outcomes that reflect their personal intentions or conceptual ideas, rather than serving a practical or commercial function. They are encouraged to work from personal experiences, thoughts, and feelings, aiming to observe and record people, places, and things in innovative ways.

Portfolios will showcase an understanding of formal elements and creative skills, including mark-making, while students will use visual communication thoughtfully to document their artistic journeys and support their intentions. Additionally, students will learn that fine art practitioners may work on client commissions or self-directed projects, requiring strong communication skills to liaise with clients and effectively promote and exhibit their work.

Business Studies

Course Code: 0450

Aims

The aims are to enable students to:

- Apply their knowledge and critical understanding to current issues and problems in a wide range of business contexts.
- Make effective use of relevant terminology, concepts and methods, and recognise the strengths and limitations of the ideas used in business.
- Distinguish between facts and opinions and evaluate qualitative and quantitative data to help build arguments and make informed judgements.
- Appreciate the perspectives of a range of stakeholders in relation to the business environment, individuals, society, government and enterprise.
- Develop knowledge and understanding of the major groups and organisations within and outside business and consider ways in which they are able to influence objectives, decisions and activities.
- Develop knowledge and understanding of how the main types of businesses are organised, financed and operated, and how their relations with other organisations, consumers, employees, owners and society are regulated.
- Develop skills of numeracy, literacy, enquiry, selection and use of relevant sources of information, presentation and interpretation.
- Develop an awareness of the nature and significance of innovation and change within the context of business activities.
- Acquire a foundation for further study of business or other subjects.

Learners will be able to:

- Understand different forms of business organisations, the environments in which businesses operate and business functions such as marketing, operations and finance.
- Appreciate the role of people in business success.

They will also gain lifelong skills, including:

- The ability to calculate and interpret business data.
- Communication skills needed to support arguments with reasons.
- The ability to analyse business situations and reach decisions or judgements.

Content Overview

- Understanding business activity
This section introduces the underlying ideas and concepts of business and includes the purpose and nature of business activity and how businesses can be classified.
- People in business
The focus is the functional area of human resources and includes the importance and methods of motivating a workforce.
- Marketing
This section includes the role of marketing, the distinctions between niche and mass markets and the techniques of market segmentation.
- Operations management
The focus is the functional area of production and includes the meaning and methods of production and how productivity can be increased.
- Financial information and decisions
This finance and accounting section covers the need for and sources of business finance, cash-flow forecasting and working cap.

- External influences on business activity
This section focuses on different external influences on business activity and how these impact on business. It includes government influences on economic, environmental and ethical issues and how they impact on the functional areas of businesses.

Chinese as a Second Language
Course Code: 0523
Exam Board: Cambridge

Aims

The aims are to enable students to:

- Develop the ability to use Chinese effectively for the purpose of practical communication.
- Form a sound foundation for the skills required for further study or employment using Chinese as the medium.
- Develop an awareness of the nature of language and language-learning skills.
- Promote learners’ personal development.

Content overview

Cambridge IGCSE Chinese as a Second Language offers learners the opportunity to develop practical communication skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing.

Learners will be presented with a variety of stimuli that will build up their skills in reading and writing. They will learn to select relevant details, understand the difference between what is directly stated and implied, and practise writing for different purposes and audiences.

Learners will listen to a range of spoken material, including talks and conversations, in order to develop listening skills.

In both written and spoken Chinese, learners will be able to respond to factual information as well as abstract ideas. Learners will engage in conversations on a variety of topics and develop their skills in expressing their viewpoints with a degree of accuracy and clarity.

Cambridge IGCSE Chinese as a Second Language will

enable learners to become independent users of Chinese and to use Chinese to communicate effectively in a variety of practical contexts.

Texts and questions are printed in both traditional and simplified characters on the question papers. Candidates choose the form they prefer in the examination and may write their answers in either traditional or simplified characters. The Speaking test is assessed in Mandarin Chinese only.

Content Overview

Cambridge IGCSE English as a Second Language offers students the opportunity to develop practical communication skills in reading, writing, listening and speaking.

Students will be presented with a variety of texts that will build up their skills in reading and writing. They will learn to select relevant details, understand the difference between what is directly stated and implied, and practise writing for different purposes and audiences.

Students will listen to a range of spoken material, including talks and conversations, to develop listening skills. Students will engage in conversations on a variety of topics and develop their skills in responding to different situations and audiences with a degree of accuracy and clarity.

Cambridge IGCSE English as a Second Language will enable students to become independent users of English both to support further study and to communicate effectively in a variety of practical contexts.

Aims

The aims describe the purposes of a course based on this syllabus. The aims are to enable students to:

- Read a wide range of texts, fluently and with good understanding, enjoying and appreciating a variety of language.
- Read critically and use knowledge gained from wide reading to inform and improve their own writing.
- Write accurately and effectively using appropriate standard language.
- Work with information and ideas in Chinese by developing skills of critical evaluation, analysis, synthesis and inference.
- Acquire and apply a wide vocabulary, alongside a knowledge and understanding of grammatical terminology and linguistic conventions.

- Deepen understanding and appreciation of Chinese culture and classical texts.

Content Overview

Cambridge IGCSE First Language Chinese offers candidates the opportunity to respond knowledgeably to a range of reading passages. Candidates will use some of these passages to inform and inspire their own writing and write in a range of text types for different audiences.

The passages cover a range of genres and types, including fiction and non-fiction, and may also include other forms of writing, such as essays, reviews and articles.

Learners will have the opportunity to read Classical Chinese prose texts to help to deepen their knowledge of Chinese culture.

We encourage learners to become appreciative and critical readers and writers of Chinese

First Language English Course Code: 0500 Exam Board: Cambridge

Aims

Cambridge IGCSE First Language English is for learners whose first language is English or for those who are capable enough of meeting the standards required of that of a native speaker.

The aims of the course will enable students to:

- Develop the ability to communicate clearly, accurately and effectively when speaking and writing.
- Use a wide range of vocabulary, and the correct grammar, spelling and punctuation.
- Develop a personal style and an awareness of the audience being addressed.
- Develop more general analysis and communication skills such as inference, and the ability to order facts and present opinions effectively.

Learners are also encouraged to read widely, both for their own enjoyment and to further their awareness of the ways in which English can be used.

Content Overview

The subject is divided into two papers, Paper 1 and Paper 2. The aims are to enable students to:

Reading

- Demonstrate understanding of written texts, and of the words and phrases within them.

- Summarise and use material for a specific context.
- Develop, analyse and evaluate facts, ideas and opinions.
- Demonstrate understanding of how writers achieve their effects and influence readers.
- Select appropriate information for specific purposes.
- Recognise and respond to linguistic devices, figurative language and imagery. In developing reading skills, candidates should engage with a range of genres and text types from the twentieth and/or twenty-first centuries, including literature, fiction and non-fiction, and other forms of writing, such as discursive essays, reviews and articles.

Students should focus on writers' use of language and style and the ways in which writers achieve effects and influence readers.

Writing

- Express what is thought, felt and imagined.
- Organise and convey facts, ideas and opinions effectively.
- Demonstrate a varied vocabulary appropriate to the context.
- Demonstrate an effective use of sentence structures.
- Demonstrate an understanding of audience, purpose and form.
- Demonstrate accuracy in spelling, punctuation and grammar.

As developing writers themselves, the students will be introduced to a range of writing skills, including the ability to create and compose texts with a variety of forms and purposes, e.g. descriptive, narrative,

discursive, argumentative and persuasive. This includes focus on the following text types: letter, report, article, journal, speech, interview and summary.

- An awareness of the contrasting opportunities and constraints presented by different environments.
- An appreciation of and concern for the environment.
- An appreciation of the earth including its people, places, landscapes, natural processes and phenomena.

Global Perspectives

Aims

The aims describe the purposes of a course based on this syllabus. The aims are to enable students to:

The aims are to enable students to:

- Become independent and confident about taking their place in a changing, information rich and connected world.
- Develop an analytical and evaluative grasp of global issues and their causes and consequences, leading to the suggestion of possible evidence-based courses of action.
- Consider the concept of sustainability when analysing issues and proposing courses of action.
- Engage with and reflect on issues, both independently and in collaboration with others and from a variety of different perspectives.
- Work independently as well as part of a team, showing responsibility for much of their own learning including using diverse and varied sources to support reasoning.
- Consider important issues from a variety of perspectives and reflect on the links between these.
- Critically assess information available to them and support judgements with lines of reasoning in order to communicate to others effectively and appropriately.

Content Overview

Cambridge IGCSE Global Perspectives is interdisciplinary in nature. The syllabus gives learners the opportunity to develop the skills they need to face global

challenges in a connected and information-rich world and to think about how best to live in a sustainable way. These challenges include how to cope with changes that will have an impact on their life chances and choices and how to gain a sense of their own active place in the world.

To support learners in facing these challenges, Cambridge IGCSE Global Perspectives develops a range of skills, including:

- researching, analysing and evaluating information
- developing and justifying a line of reasoning
- reflecting on processes and on own learning
- communicating information and reasoning
- collaborating to achieve a common outcome

These skills are transferable and useful for future study. They will help learners become active citizens of the future.

Learners are encouraged to explore ideas from others' communities, countries and cultures. Through stimulating topics, they will explore issues of global significance. They will learn to direct their own study and develop independent thought.

The Team Project has two elements:

Each team produces one Explanation of Research and Planning and one Evidence of Action. The Explanation of Research and Planning must be 300–400 words.
Personal Element (45 marks)
Each student writes a Reflective Paper on their research, their contribution to the Team Element and their personal learning. The Reflective Paper must be 750–1000 words.

History

Aims

The aims of IGCSE History are to enable students to develop:

- An interest in and enthusiasm for learning about the past.
- Knowledge and understanding of individuals, people and societies in the past.
- Knowledge that is rooted in an understanding of the nature and use of historical evidence.
- An understanding of key historical concepts: cause and consequence, change and continuity, and similarity and difference.
- An understanding of international issues in history
- Historical skills, including investigation, analysis, evaluation and communication skills.
- A sound basis for further study and the pursuit of personal interest.

Core Content: The Twentieth Century, International Relations since 1919

- Was the Treaty of Versailles fair?
- To what extent was the League of Nations a success?
- How far was Hitler's foreign policy to blame for the outbreak of war in Europe in 1939?
- Who was to blame for the Cold War?
- How effectively did the United States contain the spread of communism?
- How secure was the USSR's control over Eastern Europe, 1948–c.1989?

- Depth Study: Germany, 1918–45
- Was the Weimar Republic doomed from the start?
- Why was Hitler able to dominate Germany by 1934?
- How effectively did the Nazis control Germany, 1933–45?
- What was it like to live in Nazi German?

Literature in English

Course Code: 0475

Exam Board: Cambridge

Aims

The aims of Literature in English are to enable students to read, interpret and evaluate texts through the study of literature in English. Students develop an understanding of literal meaning, relevant contexts and of the deeper themes or attitudes that may be expressed. Through their studies, students learn to recognise and appreciate the ways in which writers use English to achieve a range of effects, and will be able to present an informed, personal response to the material they have studied.

The syllabus also encourages the exploration of wider and universal issues, promoting a better understanding of themselves and of the world around them. Students will have to demonstrate the following:

- Knowledge of the content of the text – through reference to detail and use of quotations from the text (AO1).
- Understanding of characters, relationships, situations and themes (AO2).
- Understanding of the writer's intentions and methods – response to the writer's use of language (AO3).
- Personal response – sometimes directly (answering questions such as 'What do you think?', 'What are your feelings about...?') and sometimes by implication (answering questions such as 'Explore the ways in which...') (AO4).

Mandarin Chinese

Aims

The aims describe the purposes of a course based on this syllabus. The aims are to enable students to:

- Develop the language proficiency required to communicate effectively in Mandarin Chinese at level A2 (CEFR Basic User).
- Offer insights into the culture and society of countries and communities where Chinese is spoken.
- Develop awareness of the nature of language and language learning.
- Encourage positive attitudes towards speakers of other languages and a sympathetic approach to other cultures.
- Provide enjoyment and intellectual stimulation. Develop transferable skills (e.g. memorising,

drawing of inferences) to complement other areas of the curriculum.

- Form a sound base of the skills, language and attitudes required for progression to work or further study, either in Chinese or another subject area.

Content Overview

The subject content is organised in five broad topic areas (A–E below). These provide contexts for the acquisition of vocabulary and the study of grammar and structures. The study of these topic areas enables students to gain an insight into countries and communities where Chinese is spoken. The five topic areas listed below:

- A. Everyday activities
- B. Personal and social life
- C. The world around us
- D. The world of work
- E. The international world

The syllabus gives students opportunities to develop and apply a wide range of foreign language skills. Candidates will be expected to read and understand a variety of written and spoken texts on familiar topics. Candidates will be required to demonstrate understanding of the main ideas, opinions and attitudes, as well as select and extract relevant details and deduce the meaning of occasional unknown words from context.

They will also have opportunities to write in Chinese on familiar, everyday topics, and to speak the language by taking part in everyday conversations.
